Plants that ARE on SALE each month now have their own special placards in front of them, as well as mention on our website, www.POPPAinc.org, which always has the most up-to-date information about what's happening at Recycled Gardens and/or POPPA, Inc.

Vegetables, and sometimes even annuals, are not new to RG, but where we put them now is--look for the tall green portable greenhouse frames in the South Paddock. And remember, these plants are always HALF OFF our regular prices.

SUFFERING SEEDLINGS!!!

Though we truly appreciate any and all plant donations, and couldn't exist if it weren't for the bountiful generosity of our donors, we simply do not have the volunteers necessary to keep seedling trees, shrubs and/or perennials alive at Recycled Gardens. So please, if you plan to donate plants you've grown from cuttings or seeds, do not bring them out to RG until they are of a saleable size. This means trees should fit comfortably in a 5-gallon container, shrubs in a 2- or 3-gallon pot, and perennials in at least a 1-gallon can.

By the way, if you are interested in growing perennials for us, you are very welcome to come by the nursery to pick up supplies like potting soil and nursery containers (we have seeds too!)--we're happy to encourage propagating plants by making it as easy and inexpensive as possible!

Recycled Gardens final Open for Business weekdays this year will be Thursday & Friday, September 29th and 30th, from 10am-5pm. After that it's Saturdays ONLY until April 2006!

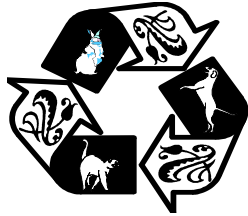

Testimonies from the Trenches

The Feger Felines

Our story with feral cats started back in the year of 1986. My husband Gary and I moved to a place in Sumner to start our life together and raise a family. Never did we imagine dealing with a colony of feral cats.

It must have been Sumner because our windows were open. Gary was outside barbecuing and the smell was going through the neighborhood. Before long I heard the loud meow of a cat. I knew it wasn't our inside cat, so after dinner I threw the scraps to the outside cat and Gary said, "You shouldn't do that." Well as time went on I noticed 2 cats. After talking to our neighbors we found out that some other neighbors had moved out and left their animals behind. The cats started having kittens and over time we had upwards of 30 cats.

One day I decided to call the humane society. They said if we could catch the cats they would take them (note from POPPA to readers: many shelters will 'take' all cats, but the ones who are not 100% tame, such as the ones in this story, are put to sleep). So Gary got a big box and decided to catch as many as he could. We put some food down and while they were eating Gary grabbed them by the back of their neck and I would open the lid and he threw them in. After getting a couple in the box, they were going nuts and Gary's arms looked like hamburger. We decided this wasn't working.

Nobody told us about live traps. More time went on and our kids were growing up. They started naming the cats and it would tear my heart out whenever one would die. We would put them in a shoe box along with a toy and we would have a burial for them. We could not afford the cost of getting them fixed or curing their diseases. So the problem went on and on.

One day at the mall they had a feral cat neuter awareness day [booth]. I called the number they gave me and spoke to a lady by the name of Lisa Wahl. She was kind enough to loan us several traps for a small deposit and worked with us to get as many cats done as possible. We captured 9 cats and had them all fixed. The next day we caught 9 more cats and had them fixed, and were able to adopt out 2 of the kittens. My husband had a shed and called it the kitty hotel. Over the next 2-day period he caught the last 5 cats.

It was with great relief and appreciation for all the volunteers, vets and vet techs who made this happen for us that we opened the trap door for the last, fixed, male cat and released him back into the colony with the rest of the fixed cats. We especially want to thank Lisa Wahl for all her hard work! THANK YOU!

Announcing the, "Everyone's talking about The Cat Show (Up!)" Campaign

I wish we could tell you that the classic, true story you just read, which mentions the good work of POPPA board member Lisa Wahl, was our first experience with 'accidental encounters of the feline kind.' In reality, we respond to calls daily about cats who 'show up.'

They're either abandoned, tame strays or they've been 'out there' so long that they and their offspring have reverted to non-tame (feral) status. Either way, we can help.

People don't always know what to do when they see a new cat outside. They're reluctant to interfere and take charge of the situation. What if the cat belongs to someone else? What if he's just passing through? What if I let him in and he gets my indoor cats sick? What if the cat scratches when I grab her? What if I can't catch her? What if I catch her and no appointment is open? And besides, they're not really MY cats...

It's easier to just put some food out (or not) and hope the problem takes care of itself. Folks find out about POPPA as they research how to solve problems that have occurred, most often as a result of feeding kitties without taking them to the vet.

We're contacted *after* at least one litter of kittens materializes (a rude awakening that she's an unsprayed female)! *After* the males get to be 5-6 months old and are spraying urine, fighting, or yowling. *After* another neighbor is fed up and threatening to dispose of the cats either at a shelter or by 'other means.'

What to do? We're launching an effort to spread the word that Job One is to get an unfamiliar cat to a clinic, before problems develop. Even if that means the kitty needs to be humanely (live) trapped in order to be brought in. We're calling this awareness effort, "Everyone's Talking about **The Cat Show (Up!)**." Why should we pay money to attend a fancy, schmancy, purebred cat show, when the most beautiful (and helpless) kitties are right in our own back yards? They're dying to be the stars of the show!

How do we propose to help?

- Make available on our website a list of clinics who will scan for a chip and check spay/neuter status, free of charge and on short notice.
- Provide spay/neuter referrals and/or assistance when people contact us at 503-626-4070 or visit the spay/neuter page at www.POPPAinc.org.
- Make use of low-cost outreach resources, such as fliers, news releases, and informational emails, so the cat-loving public knows where to turn for help.
- Lend out or provide referrals for the use of humane (live) traps for feral cat Trap, Neuter, Return (TNR).
- Provide mentoring, support, advice and advocacy for caring individuals who want to be a responsible friend to cats of indeterminate origin.

How can YOU help, too?

Spread the word! Give out POPPA's website and phone number whenever you hear someone mention a cat who has 'shown up.' Even if they're not low income, we can still provide information so they can get on the right track to a humane solution. If they say, "It's not MY cat," remind them that's just the problem; he or she is not anyone ELSE's cat, either! No innocent animal should ever suffer from abandonment--there's no shame in being a beacon of light for a shipwrecked sailor.

Stay informed! Feral/stray cats are just as healthy as pets: fleas and other parasites, viruses, birth defects, etc. Where they differ is that the majority isn't yet spayed/neutered—but that's easy enough to 'fix!' More info at www.alleycat.org.

Give generously! When the weather turns cold is the perfect time of year to launch a spay/neuter campaign. Kitten season has slowed down, meaning fewer females are in heat, pregnant and/or nursing a litter. The spay surgery easier is on her and less expensive/stressful/complicated for the people involved. POPPA needs your help to raise the funds necessary to make a widespread effort to 'recruit' recipients during this season! Most of our funding comes from the Recycled Gardens resale nursery and garden center, but plant sales start to slow when the rains come. So, right when we can do the most good is when we have the least funding. A donation of as little as \$25 completely covers the neuter of a wayfaring wanderer. Please donate securely online, or send checks made out to POPPA to: POPPA, PO Box 5721 Beaverton OR 97006. We'll use it right away, and directly for the animals—no salaries, we're all volunteers! Teamwork Divides Pay-ment and Doubles Spay-ment

No one charity can do it all...this reality provides opportunities to work together, sharing ideas and resources. POPPA is always thrilled to collaborate with others such as gardening clubs, veterinarians and animal shelters, keepin' that spay/neuter fever goin' 'round.

Now, we're working more closely than ever with fellow animal organizations, to provide a 'full coverage' spay/neuter 'security blanket.' For example, In the Salem and Portland areas, we've all been working as a behind-the-scenes collective to make sure no patient in true need is left behind. This means less duplication and simple, easy programs for underprivileged Oregonians.

Fido Philanthropists Help Solve Doggie Dilemma!

POPPA is currently the only service in NW Oregon to subsidize dog spays/neuters, which at a minimum of \$44 are more costly than cat or even rabbit fixes. Cash donations are especially crucial this time of year; Recycled Garden sales have tapered off, grant funders are closed for the year, and the calls for help with dogs surgeries are on the rise (up about 50% this summer).

We're asking all dog lovers with 'a dog who has everything' to consider a donation to throw a lifeline to another canine. When you make a donation to POPPA instead of buying an already-pampered pet a designer accessory or fancy toy, an underprivileged pooch enjoys the life-long benefits of a spay/neuter surgery.
